Home-baking...

Year 12 have made Christmassy Gingerbread Men biscuits. Have a go at this recipe yourself, taken from www.bbcgoodfood.co.uk

You Will Need:

- 225g plain flour, plus extra for dusting
- ½ tsp salt
- 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 1 heaped tsp ground ginger
- ½ tsp cinnamon
- 50g unsalted butter
- 100g soft brown sugar
- 100g golden syrup



Method

1. Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5 and line a baking tray with baking parchment.
2. Sieve the flour, salt, bicarb, ginger and cinnamon into a large bowl.
3. In a pan, heat the butter, sugar and syrup until dissolved.
4. Leave the sugar mixture to cool slightly, then mix into the dry ingredients to form a dough. Chill the dough in the fridge for 30 mins.
5. On a surface lightly dusted with flour, roll out the dough to a ¼-inch thickness. Stamp out the gingerbread men shapes with a cutter, then re-roll any off-cuts and repeat.
6. Place your gingerbread shapes on the lined trays, allowing space for them to spread.
7. Cook for 10-15 mins, then remove from the oven and leave to cool.
8. Decorate them with icing.



Who Are We?

Poppy Appeal 2021

Our amazing team of collectors have been at the heart of the Poppy Appeal for 100 years and, as Covid-19 restrictions ease, they are back in local communities across the United Kingdom to raise vital funds for the Armed Forces community this Poppy Appeal. Poppies are worn as a show of support for the Armed Forces community. The poppy is a well-known and well-established symbol, one that carries a wealth of history and meaning with it. Wearing a poppy is still a very personal choice, reflecting individual experiences and personal memories. It is never compulsory but is greatly appreciated by those who it is intended to support. During WW1, much of the fighting took place in Western Europe. The countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over repeatedly. Previously beautiful landscapes turned to mud; bleak and barren scenes where little or nothing could grow. There was a notable and striking exception to the bleakness - the bright red Flanders poppies. These resilient flowers flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, growing in the thousands upon thousands.


