Oaklands School—An Introduction

Oaklands School is located in Cheshire West and Chester Local Authority and currently serves the whole of the previous Cheshire County. All pupils have an Education, Health and Care Plan with moderate learning difficulties stated to be their most significant difficulty.

A number of pupils also have severe learning difficulties, social, emotional and behavioural difficulties or speech and communication difficulties. In line with their learning difficulties, the attainment of pupils is significantly below what is expected for their age when they enter the school. There are three classes in Year 7 to Year 11 and one Year 12 class, which are organized largely by academic ability.

Oaklands is a child centered outstanding school, where pupils learn in a nurturing and happy environment. The caring environment provided by the excellent and supportive staff, enables pupils to achieve to their potential and experience many enriching and positive experiences.

The Governors and Staff of Oaklands School are proud of our achievements and the school's standing in the community. It is our hope that all students joining us will quickly share our pride and make a positive contribution to the life of the school.

We are a caring and happy community, where each individual is supported and encouraged. All students enjoy equality of opportunity, regardless of sex, race or ability. Our aim is to ensure that our students leave us as caring young adults who have developed positive attitudes and values and are respectful of others. Our key focus is to provide Oaklands' students with the skills and knowledge to be successful and lead happy and fulfilling lives. We believe that education thrives best within a partnership of student, parent and school. Parental contact is actively sought and always welcome.

We lay importance on learning outside the classroom and students are given opportunities to experience educational visits.

CURRICULUM:

At Oaklands School we aim to provide a curriculum for our students which allows a personalized experience designed to meet their individual needs. This is achieved by:

- Treating all students as individuals
- Planning learning to meet the needs of all our students

KEY STAGE 3 Curriculum—Years 7, 8 and 9:

The subjects studied are:

English, Maths, Science, a Modern Foreign Language, Geography, History, Art, Music, PE, RE, Computing, PSHE (Personal, Social, Health Education), RSHE, Careers and Citizenship.

KEY STAGE 4 Curriculum—Years 10 and 11:

As well as following core and foundation subjects, PSHE, RSHE and Careers, students are able to choose from a range of option subjects to make up their studies including, Hospitality and Catering, ICT, Hair and Beauty, Animal Care, Health and Fitness and Child Care.

PARTNERSHIP WITH PARENTS

The school stresses the importance of activities outside the classroom and encourages all students to take an active part. Some support and enhance the curriculum, improving students' understanding or providing opportunities to develop skills, while others allow students to follow personal interests and to get involved in new opportunities.

SENCO

The SENCO is responsible for:

- Co-ordinating the whole-school provision for SEND
- Ensuring the appropriate educational provision, including resources, is available to support the needs identified within the EHCP
- Being responsive to requests for advice from all stakeholders, particularly from teachers and teaching assistants
- Establishing training requirements for staff and contributing, as appropriate, to their training
- Maintaining school systems and records
- Liaising with parents as necessary, including conducting EHCP annual, transfer or transition reviews
- Liaising with external support agencies, including the educational psychologist, health and social services and voluntary bodies.

As a school which caters for children and young people with special educational needs, all students at Oaklands School will have an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

All staff within the school are responsible for delivering the day to day provision for all students, everyone has a key role to play in supporting pupil development. This is in line with the expectations outlined in the SEND Code of Practice 2014.

The aim at Oaklands School is to enable all young people to achieve their potential through a fully inclusive curriculum. The Educational Curriculum at the school is based upon the National Curriculum. An inclusive curriculum is one where all learners:

- Experience a child centred approach, where they are supported in a nurturing, safe and appropriate environment
- See the relevance of the curriculum to their own experiences and aspirations.
- Have sufficient opportunities to succeed in their learning at the highest standard.

For students in Key stage 4 and the Sixth Form, there are a range of accreditation available that meets the full range of abilities and aptitudes of all the students at the school. Opportunities are also available for students to pursue individual interests through a range of additional curriculum opportunities which are reviewed annually. Each student has an individual timetable that details their core subjects and the 'optional subject' choices they have made. The subjects taught enhance well-being, develop skills for independent living and promote citizenship.

A YEAR IN THE LIFE OF OAKLANDS SCHOOL

Oaklands School offers pupils a broad, balanced, relevant and differentiated curriculum built on the firm base of our National Curriculum. In addition the curriculum is enriched by the involvement of visiting professionals, a wide range of educational visits, residential visits and participation in a range of outside sporting events. The following examples are just some of the events the pupils and staff may participate in during the academic year:

September sees us welcome our new year 7's and open the doors to another exciting and fulfilling academic year. The students soon settle in and begin to make new friends and participate in everything Oaklands has to offer.

In October our year 8 students participate in a three day residential visit to Conway and have the opportunity to take part in a range of outdoor activities. We also hold a coffee morning to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support.

Further activities follow in November when our girls football team take part in a football tournament held at Manchester City.

December is always a busy month in school, and it starts off with our choir taking part in the WEP Christmas Carol concert held at the Winsford Lifestyle Centre. This is followed by a visit to a pantomime and Christmas Jumper Day in aid of Save the Children. The month ends with a Christmas carol concert in church and a Christmas lunch and disco.

In January it is the turn of our boys football team to attend the football tournament at Manchester City.

Our Year 7 students visit Bangor Racecourse in February as part of their learning outside of the classroom, whilst our Year 11 students all participate in a one week work experience placement.

March is another busy month as our Year 9 students take part in a residential visit to Red Ridge in Mid Wales and get involved in a wide range of outdoor activities. We also visit Chester Zoo, watch a Creepy Crawley show and hold a Lego workshop for Science Week!

Year 12 students undertake their one week work experience placements in April which are always a great success!

Our Year 7 students set off for their residential visit to Condover Hall in May, whilst June brings exams for our Year 11 students and a visit to the Cheshire Show for our school choir.

July is always a busy month as rehearsals for our summer production begin with staff and students working extremely hard to prepare for the show. The year ends with a celebration rewards assembly, and school closes for summer following a very busy and exciting year!



POST 16

As part of the sixth form at Oaklands School we are able to offer a supportive and inclusive environment where students can develop their social skills whilst following academic and practical courses designed to meet their specific needs.

Students are no longer subject to the expectations of the National Curriculum but they continue to focus on a broad range of subjects including the core subjects of numeracy, literacy, ICT, Personal and Social Development; key skills areas and vocational pathways.

This is to ensure that our students leave school as independent as possible in order to move on to the next stage of their life. Activities in the sixth form therefore reflect the age and changing needs of our students. This means that the curriculum is based on the teaching of functional skills with the aim of students being able to generalise and apply these in as many everyday contexts and in as many practical ways within the community as possible.

Post-16 students will enjoy an environment in which all students experience an increased level of independence, challenge and supportive guidance. We believe in developing the whole individual by providing opportunities to pursue ambitions, interests and passions whilst making a positive contribution to the school community. The life and work skills students develop in Oaklands will help prepare them to face the next step.

We want to develop and nurture independence, confidence and self-esteem by building on and generalising skills and developing new skills, knowledge and understanding to enable them to become as independent as possible in order to prepare students for life beyond school

In short, we aim for the sixth form students to become successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens and an effective contributor during their year in sixth form.

ADMISSIONS TO OAKLANDS SCHOOL

All pupils who attend Oaklands have an Education Health and Care Plan. Applications to the school are made from the Local Authority Statutory Assessment Team. All advice givers will have supported such a request. The final decision is made after consultation between the parents, child, school and Local authority. If all agree, then a place is offered.
