Social media support from parents

If you do allow your child to access social media, we ask for your vigilance. Just like their interactions in person, online interactions require supervision and support. What is right will vary from family to family but some strategies that are known to be successful include:

- Monitoring their phones for the apps that are downloaded;
- Enacting parental controls on phones and consoles;
- Reviewing the messages they send on platforms and apps – making monitoring part of a daily or weekly routine;
- Setting expectations about what space (preferably communal) and times they have access to devices;
- Encouraging them to share or discuss with you what they are doing.

Instagram New Messaging Settings

Meta is introducing more safety features on its Instagram platform. These new Instagram features (some of which will be transitioned into Facebook Messenger) include:

- Limiting teens' ability to see sensitive content.
- Nudges to encourage teens to close Instagram at night.
- Stricter private messaging (adults should not be able to privately message children who don't follow those adults).
- Children can only be messaged by people they already follow or are connected to.
