"Oaklands School Choir is open to any student in years 7-12. We are currently working on a selection on songs that we will perform at this years Cheshire Show which is on Wednesday 22nd June 2022! This will be the first public performance that the school choir have taken part in since 2019 - before the pandemic! We are learning around 9 songs for this event and the repertoire includes 'A Million Dreams' and 'This Is Me' from The Greatest Showman.

"Oaklands School Chamber Choir is a smaller group of invited students, who have all demonstrated a talent in music and/or singing. These students are put through their paces during lunchtime rehearsals and sing repertoire that includes more parts - we rarely sing in unison. Chamber Choir will also be performing at The Cheshire Show and we have some other performances to look forward to as well."

It's that time of year when Year 9 and 10 students start to choose their Options ready for next year. We asked this year's Year 10 and 11s what they thought of their Options studied this year...


Animal Care - Mrs Meachin

St Luke's Hospice is a charity that looks after people who are very sick or near the end of their lives. This amazing charity was founded in the year of 1983 by Harold Hassall & Jim Littlemore. In 1988, The Princess of Wales, "Princess Diana", officially opened St Luke's Hospice to look after very sick people to this day.



What do they do?

The Hospice has very special carers, nurses and doctors there that look after people who are very sick or near to the end of their life. Patients in the hospice can walk around and explore the hospital if they want for their medical needs.

What do they Offer?

The Hospice also welcomes everyone who visits there if they want to visit someone they know well who is facing a life shortening illness. So you still have a close friend by your side being taken care of by the hospice!

Events They Host

In specific times of the year, the hospice hosts different events to raise money for them. These events can be walks, skydives, abseiling, fun games or even challenges if you want to really compete. After events, the hospice receives lots and lots of money from these events that go towards people who have life threatening illnesses. The hospice actually costs about £3 Million to fully run each year!



How are Oaklands going to support St Luke's Hospice?

All of us students will have a St Luke's Bus money box given to us, you need to put your spare change of money in the box to support St Luke's Hospice. Home-baking...

To celebrate the Queen's Jubilee, have a go at making this British classic meal of Bangers and Mash! The Hospitality and Catering group made it and the Year 12's certainly recommend it too

You Will Need:

- 4X Sausages
- Olive oil
- 4X Large Potatoes
- 1 tsp Milk
- 1 tsp Margarine
- seasoning
- 1X Onion
- Gravy Granules



Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 160*C.
- 2. Heat the oil in the dish. After the oil has been heated, add the sausages to the dish and put in the oven for 40minutes, turning them half way through.
- 3. Meanwhile, peel the potatoes, cut them into chunks and boil for 20 minutes until soft.
- 4. When the potatoes are cooking, peel and chop the onions.
- 5. Fry onions until soft.
- 6. Make the gravy using boiling water and add to the softened onions.
- 7. Drain potatoes using the colander. Put the potatoes back in the pan and mash. Add in the butter and milk. Season with salt and pepper.
- 8. Serve the mashed potato and sausages on the plate and spoon over the onion gravy.
